### MEETING MINUTES

<u>Call to Order:</u> The meeting convened at 7:00 p.m. on May 11th, 2017 at the MCL Cafeteria with the club vice president, Scott McGaha, presiding.

<u>Attendees:</u> Scott McGaha, Brett & Peg Andrews, Nancy & Julie Blake, Beverly Knauper & Jim Ross, Guy & Jan Gifford, and Darrel York.

<u>Announcements:</u> Scott opened the meeting by mentioning that Roger and Lisa were unable to attend tonight as they were in Virginia helping with family matters. Scott moved that the minutes of the April 2017 club meeting be approved as published in the May 2017 newsletter and then opened the floor for comment. The only correction mentioned was that in one location when discussing our club outing to the Halderman Museum, the owner's first name was shown as "Dale" when it should have been "Gale". Hearing no other corrections or concerns, the minutes were approved as published.

Moving on to the question if anyone one had purchased a new T-bird or had done any restoration work, Nancy happily pointed out that after 1 year and 9 months her T-bird is now working - All problems have been resolved.

Scott mentioned he had his bird serviced for the spring. His power steering pump was leaking, so a new seal kit was installed and all is well. After a little carburetor adjustment from running a little rich he's now ready to hit the roads for the cruise-in and car show season.

### REPORTS:

**Treasurer's Report:** With the absence of the treasurer and none of the other officer having their copy of the April Financial Report with them, the Treasurer's Report of the club's current financial status was not presented.

# Some Engine Oils Currently on the Shelves Can Harm Your Engine - Read the Labels!

There are engine oils currently on the shelves at auto parts stores, gas station convenience stores, food stores, and other retail outlets that can cause harm to your car's engine. These are obsolete engine oils formulated for use in cars built prior to the 1930s! Know how to read the labels on the front and back of the bottles of oil you buy or you may be using a product that can cause unsatisfactory performance or harm to your engine.

The service rating of passenger car and commercial automotive motor oils is classified by the American Petroleum Institute (API). The program certifies that engine oil meets certain Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM) quality and performance standards. The service rating is shown in the API "Service Symbol Donut" on the product label. As shown in the illustration below, engine oils with an API SA Service Classification were formulated for use in cars built prior to 1930, and are now obsolete. Yet, they are still not hard to find in retail outlets.


The labels include two important pieces of information to determine if an engine oil is appropriate for use in your vehicle. The first piece of information speaks to viscosity grade. The <u>Society of Automotive Engineers</u> (SAE) defines a numerical system for grading motor oils according to viscosity. The first number (0, 5, 10, 15 and 25) followed by the letter W designate the engine oil's "winter" grade. Look to your owner's manual. It specifies the viscosity grade required for your car's engine. Today, the most common grades are 5W-30.

### Watch for the "W"

Whereas the labeling on the bottle of engine oil may suggest the product is a 5W-30, note, if there is no "W" between the 5 and the 30 it may not be a 5W-30. As an example, a SAE 5-30 is not the same as an SAE 5W-30.

The next 'code" to look for is the API Service Classification. Although it might appear complicated to understand at the start, it is really a simple system to get your arms around. Think of it this way, when cars were first built, the oil they required needed an API SA Service Classification. From there, it moved to SB, SC, SD, and so on (skipping only SI and SK). The current API Service Classification is SN. So if you buy an engine oil meeting only API SA, it's an engine oil formulated for use in vehicles built in the 1920s. It is not hard to find other API service classifications mixed in with SN on the shelves. Also, don't let price guide you. Engine oils with a Service Classification prior to SN (including SA) are often priced close to that of API SN.
