MEETING MINUTES

Call to Order: The meeting was convened at 7:00 p.m. on August 10th, 2017 at the MCL Cafeteria by the club president, Roger Hamm.

Announcements:

Roger welcomed all the attendees to the meeting. He then moved for acceptance of the July club meeting minutes as written in the August 2017 newsletter. Hearing no questions or concerns, the minutes were accepted as published. When asked, no one indicated any changes to their contact information nor did anyone have any leads on any new perspective club members.

Roger then queried the membership if there had been any t-birds purchased, sold, or had any repairs or restorations. Tom mentioned his bird had been in Roster's for fluid leak repairs and some major rework on his flywheel. Tom also mentioned he was obtaining some pictures of one or more t-birds that had been supposedly stored in a barn for an extended period of time.

Roger announced that this month it was Bea Walsh's birthday and he and Lisa's wedding anniversary. The membership echoed a hardy Happy Anniversary to the pair.

REPORTS:

Treasurer's Report: The club treasurer gave the monthly financial status report stating that there had been no change in our account balance since the previous financial report.

Event Planning: Scott began by mentioning how much fun we all had at our third annual gathering at the Valley Vineyard Restaurant in Morrow and that he was pleased with the great attendance we had. He then informed the group that members of the Miami Valley Car Club has expressed an interest in participating with us in the "Donut Trail Run" should our club chose to do that again this year.

Scott then identified August 11th as the last of the Voss Cruise-ins for the year as well as highlighting several other local area car shows and cruise-ins that we taking place in the near term. Scott switched to discussing the possibility of our club touring "Green Sales", a Ford parts warehouse in Cincinnati, as a club event later this year. Scott had previously toured this site and provided his insights into its uniqueness and strongly suggested it would be well worth seeing. There seemed to be significant support

for the idea. There will be further discussion on this opportunity at a future meeting. Finally it was mentioned that the Springfield Car Show and Swap Meet would be held at the Clark County Fairgrounds on September 8th, 9th, and 10th.

Why 90 Degree Days in the Fall. Isn't Fall Supposed to be Cool and Pretty?

All my life my view (maybe wish) on how the seasons work was based on 4 assumptions: (1) on the first day of Spring, tulips should be popping through the ground and the temperature should be getting warmer, (2) on the first day of Summer it should start to get hot, (3) on the first day of Fall it should begin to cool and the trees should start to look beautiful, and (4) and on the first day of Winter we should start expecting snow. But life has shown us all that it can be cold and snowy in spring and there can be fall days as hot as summer. I'm pretty sure I learned in science class in elementary school how the seasons work, but forgot. Remember, when I was in elementary school there wasn't nearly as much science, or anything else for that matter, to learn about, that's why we had longer recesses. By happenstance I ran into this little snip-it of information about the seasons. It re-enforced my lost understanding and I thought, though not car related, you may enjoy the refresher as well. So below is a simple look at how our seasons happen. Personally, and sadly, for me the first sentence says it all.


"The four seasons are determined by shifting sunlight (not heat!) — which is determined by how our planet orbits the Sun and the tilt of its axis.

On the vernal equinox (March 20th), day and night are each approximately 12 hours long (with the actual time of equal day and night, in the Northern Hemisphere, occurring a few days before the vernal equinox). The Sun crosses the celestial equator going northward; it rises exactly due east and sets exactly due west.

On the summer solstice (June 21st), we enjoy the most daylight of the calendar year. The Sun reaches its most northern point in the sky at local noon. After this date, the days start getting "shorter," i.e., the length of daylight starts to decrease.

On the autumnal equinox (September 22nd), day and night are each about 12 hours long (with the actual time of equal day and night, in the Northern Hemisphere, occurring a few days after the autumnal equinox). The Sun crosses the celestial equator going southward; it rises exactly due east and sets exactly due west.

The winter solstice (December 21st) is the "shortest day" of the year, meaning the least amount of sunlight. The Sun reaches its most southern point in the sky at local noon. After this date, the days start getting "longer", i.e., the length of daylight starts to increase.



So the epiphany to me has been that, as an example, since the days start getting shorter immediately after the Summer Solstice (June 21st - first day of summer) we're in the middle of the summer, not the beginning, and we're heading toward fall, the Autumnal Equinox (September 22nd - first day of fall). So whether the date is a solstice or equinox, we're already approximately half way to the next season starting. The dates we recognize (Mar 20, Jun 21, Sep 22, Dec 21) as the season change dates are really the halfway points in a season and we're already well on our way to the next season. These dates actually tell us the location of the sun. Whoaaaaa! Now that I'm almost 72, I once again understand what the season change dates really mean. However, no matter how unrealistic, I still like my definitions better.
