

The Covered Bridges on the TSWO 2024 Covered Bridge Tour



The Warnke Covered Bridge is a historic covered bridge crossing Swamp Creek in Harrison Township, Preble County, Ohio, northeast of Lewisburg. Built from 1895 to 1896 by Everett S. Sherman, it has a span of 51 feet. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1976.



The Geeting Covered Bridge is a historic covered bridge crossing Price's Creek on Price Road west of Lewisburg, Ohio. It was built in 1894 by Everett S. Sherman, one of at least 20 covered bridges built by Sherman in Preble County, Ohio



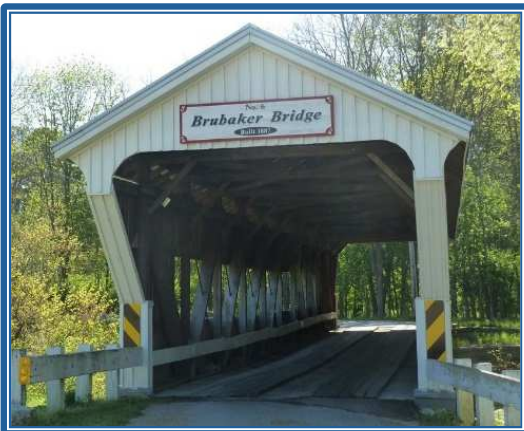
The Christman Covered Bridge is a historic covered bridge that carries Eaton-New Hope Road over Seven Mile Creek in Washington Township, Preble County, Ohio, northwest of the city of Eaton. It was built in 1895 by Everett S. Sherman. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1976.



The Harshman Covered Bridge near Fairhaven, Ohio, was built in 1894 by Everett S. Sherman. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1976. It was documented by the Historic American Engineering Record in 2003.



On June 23, 2012, over 100 years since the last covered bridge was built, the all-new Hueston Woods Covered Bridge was dedicated. This bridge is a Burr Arch truss construction, and it has a span of 108 feet over Four Mile Creek in Hueston Woods State Park.



The Brubaker Bridge, built in 1887, can be found on Brubaker Road and crosses Sam's Run Creek. At almost 90 feet in length, the Brubaker Covered Bridge is one of seven remaining Child's truss covered bridges left in the United States. This particular bridge has an open center panel. The Brubaker Bridge is unique because the upper portion of the sides of the bridge have been removed to allow light and a clear line of sight through the bend in the road past the structure.



The Germantown Covered Bridge was erected in 1870 and restored in 1963 when it was 93 years old. It is reputed to be the only existing covered bridge of its kind in the world. For 41 years this unique inverted bow string truss covered bridge spanned Little Twin Creek on the Dayton Pike in Germantown, Ohio. In 1911 it was moved to its present location.
